## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30 June 2023

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

A year ago, I reported that the year had been a continuing struggle, having emerged from the pandemic and lockdowns, and into other intersecting issues, such as the cost of living crisis. My note of optimism was that we had not gone down in flames, while many businesses and charities had not survived. Survival was important not just for us but because of the many people who need us to be there, in the community, being a place of comfort, meaning and activity.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

## Objectives and aims

The Ecology Centre's mission is to provide direct experience of the environment to help people improve their quality of life. The Centre's vision is of an aware society at the heart of a sustainable environment.

#### Our aims are:

- To provide first class environmental experiences, tailored to the needs of those who come here to learn and participate.
- To improve health and wellbeing, increase individuals' skills and encourage social contact by providing volunteering experiences for people with a range of backgrounds.
- To strengthen the sense of community' through events and activities.

#### Our services include:

- Environmental education for nursery and school children, youth organisations, community groups and those with challenging behaviour.
- Outdoor volunteering opportunities for a wide variety of people including unemployed people, individuals with disabilities, trainees, students and people with mental health problems.
- Tool shed volunteering to refurbish tools that are then donated to good causes at home and abroad, including sessions for people living with dementia.
- Development and maintenance of grounds by Kinghorn Loch as a community resource, to encourage and enable outdoor recreational activities, such as walking, cycling and picnicking.
- Community events and workshops to encourage the local community to be involved at the Centre, learn new skills and enjoy the environment.
- Citizen Science, involving the community in wildlife monitoring.
- Our Bright Future Modern Apprenticeships in Estate Maintenance, offering placements for young people to learn skills in environmental work and gain experience and confidence to enhance their opportunities in the workplace.
- Delivery of community and education projects in partnership with others.

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Becoming a SCIO

At the AGM in 2023, the decision to become a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation) was accepted. This meant a considerable reduction in admin. While still accountable to OSCR, we no longer have a locus with Companies House. All the information remaining with Companies House is historical.

### **Funding**

While our success rate in getting funds was above the average, a lot of this was in smaller amounts, needing a huge input in effort and time. But some efforts bore significantly richer fruits. We had, and have, much to be grateful for from the support we have had over a few years from the National Lottery. We are in Year Three now of support to pay staff wages and this has meant we could do a whole range of things through 22/23.

We are also looking at the final year of funding to make us a hub for Restoration Forth, which is supported by WWF (World Wildlife Fund). Our important role is planting seagrass to restore habitat in the Forth. We have enjoyed partnering with WWF on this vital project and hope our strong efforts will allow us to continue to host any next exciting Restoration Forth or other such projects at our site.

In the spring of 2023, we secured funding from New Opportunities Fife to employ a caseworker and support people in long term unemployment to come to TEC for 4 week blocks to learn about working on the site and land and garden, or to undertake a Forest and Outdoor Learning course. The intention is to build confidence, develop skills and let people try something different. Already we have recruited almost 50 volunteers and have some moving success stories. We shall put all efforts to continue to be viewed by Fife Council as a worthy partner in this venture.

We also secured around £20,000 from Cycle Scotland to have two adult and two childrens' bicycles available for community use, and look forward to this being available in the coming weeks.

## **Income Generation**

An Income Generation Group was set up to take on the activities undertaken by the Ecology Centre Enterprise group, which we disbanded. In September 2022, we had a successful and enjoyable Harvest Event, selling plants, trying things out, and the yard rang out with music all day played by talented local musicians. The café income was greatly enhanced, and it was a good community event.

We repeated a similar exercise at Christmas with a successful and enjoyable Christmas Fair, with stalls from various Community organisations, to our mutual benefit.

It is these kinds of small scale events that bring in unrestricted funds that we can use for buying things we need to invest in to solve day to day needs that arise.

The Income Generation Group meets monthly to dream up fun, community, interactive money generating ideas, and welcomes anyone with appropriate skills and experience who would like to help.

#### **Finance**

We shall not rest on our laurels but a bit of extra work went into applications for grants and some imaginative problem solving has meant that, coming out of FY22/23 into 23/24, we are currently in a better financial position than we have been for some time.

### Staffing

We had a higher than expected turnover in staff in FY22/23. We were spread quite thinly to undertake our projects but, by the start of FY23/24, we started to have more hands on deck. Our volunteers have also been a huge support in helping us complete important projects.

#### Education

At the beginning of the financial year, we recruited a new Education Manager and, at the end of the year, in June 2023, we recruited two new education officers. This team of three is fully engaged, working with schools and other groups, working with supported volunteers, and offering Forest and Outdoor Learning Awards (FOLA) training now to those volunteers coming through New Opportunities Fife.

#### The Nest Café

This venture was in its second year, is popular with the community, and has regular customers who come from far afield. The Café is building up a fan base and trying new things, including moving to more locally sourced produce in order to reduce carbon emissions by cutting down on food miles and ensuring that we continue to seek opportunities for our day to day operations to represent of our values.

### **Board of Trustees**

There were several changes to the membership of the Board of Trustees during the year. There were a couple of leavers, primarily due to other personal commitments taking up too much time. Paul Harley joined the board. Paul was already a dedicated volunteer on the site and brings legal expertise to us from his professional background.

## **Community Larder and Fridge**

This has been on the go for almost two years now. Its purpose is to reduce food waste. While it is not a Food Bank, we have been networking with local groups to widen the distribution of this food to where it is most needed, and will continue to develop this.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW Financial position

The Accounts for the year to 30 June 2023 show a surplus of £871 (2022: deficit £26,073).

At 30 June 2023 reserves stood at £704,069 (2022: £703,198), with £52,402 (2022: £54,440) of these being unrestricted general reserves, £60,801 (2022: £44,718) being restricted reserves and £590,866 (2022: £604,040) being designated funds representing the book value of tangible fixed assets.

#### Reserves policy

The Executive Committee of the Ecology Centre manages its reserves in such a way as to ensure that it has sufficient funds to meet various identified contingencies and foreseeable costs. The Committee considers it prudent to encompass within its policy the monitoring of the following buffers:

- The cash requirement to cover 3 months' running costs
- Sufficient funding to cover legal and financial liabilities pertaining to the wind up of the organisation

A savings account is held with the Ecology Building Society where "spare" funds are retained gaining higher interest.

The Trustees estimate their required reserves to be £99,000. At 30 June 2023 unrestricted free reserves stood at £52,402 (2022: £54,440). The Trustees are aware that the figure is not sufficient to meet the requirement of the policy being applied but will seek ways to change it by unrestricted income generation.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

## Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are recruited to ensure representation of a broad and appropriate range of skills, experience and qualities, to create an effective governing Board. Applicants go through a formal recruitment process before being appointed. Each year one third of trustees shall retire and then present themselves for re-election.

### Organisational structure

Full membership of The Ecology Centre is open to all those living in defined postcodes of Kinghorn, Burntisland, Aberdour and Auchtertool areas. Full members are eligible to attend AGMs and take part in decision-making over the running and future of the Centre. Those based outside this radius may join as associate members, but do not have voting rights.

The internal management team deal with the day-to-day management of the organisation as overseen by the General Manager.

## In Summary

To come to a close in the vein in which I began, the year had its own challenges, and these have been largely overcome. We look ahead to supporting our community with new energy, more networking, successful funding bids and new ideas and beneficiaries. Our thanks go to those who believed in us enough to support various initiatives. To the National Lottery; to WWF and Restoration Forth; to Fife Council and New Opportunities Fife; to Hubbub for the Community Larder; to Cycle Scotland; to the smaller funds that made their contributions; to the staff team who stepped up to keep everything going when the team shrunk a bit for a while; to my fellow trustees for their commitment and tenacity and generosity with their time and energy....my appreciation and heartfelt thanks.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2023

### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Ecology Centre (SCIO) ("the charity") is Scottish charitable incorporated organisation governed by its constitution. It was registered as a charity in Scotland (registered number SC028174) on 11 August 1998. Its registered address is Kinghorn Loch, Kinghorn, Fife, KY3 9YG.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005;
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities;
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 10% on cost and in accordance with the property

Plant and machinery - 33% on cost and 10% on cost

Motor vehicles - 20% on cost

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The Ecology Centre is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

## Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### 25. PURPOSE OF FUNDS

The designated funds relate to the land and buildings that the Ecology Centre operates from. During the year, all fixed assets were transferred to this fund.

Our Bright Future provided wages and associated costs for the young people undertaking modern apprenticeships in Estate Maintenance onsite.

GCAIL A grant from Fife Council Community Works programme assisted our trainees and us with the development of landscaping and facilities on the site.

Fairer Fife, Funding secured to deliver a Family Learning Programme at the Cottage in Kirkcaldy, focusing on outdoor learning.

Chance to Study, Match funding towards the delivery of our Muddy Boots Programme.

Climate Challenge Fund and CCAF, Climate Challenge Fund from the Scottish Government supported our Lemon Squeezy project in 2016 and the Fit For Purpose project in 2017, following on from the success of 2015's Easy Peas-y project to encourage our community to grow its own vegetables and reduce the purchase of produce with high food miles. The fund also supported the development and implementation of our Tool Shed, where volunteers renovate old tools to stop them from going to landfill. Some of the tools are collated into kits and sent overseas to help people in developing countries to set up their own small businesses.

Tool Sales, Funds to support the delivery of the tool shed programme. This programme is now running funded by unrestricted income.

Sharing Skills, The funds were received for the redevelopment of the market garden to increase the growing space. The value of the fixed assets purchased from this fund have been transferred to the designated fixed asset fund.

Edina Trust, The Edina Trust supported a new education programme focused on the Fife shoreline: Coastal Classrooms and Seashore Science.
